Planning Commission, and Board of Zoning Appeals the Normal Board of Trustees, Planning Commission, and Zoning Board of Appeals with certain basic planning services designed to assist them in making day to day decisions which have planning and development implications.

# Regional Studies

## Stormwater

The Commission has continued to coordinate the work necessary to complete a plan for dealing with stormwater problems in the urban area. The work accomplished this year includes:

- 60 of the 76 orthophoto topographic maps have been completed.
- each municipality has completed an analysis of the location and capacity of its existing storm sewer system; and
- the Corps of Engineers has begun a two year study which will lead to the development of a plan to alleviate the problems associated with flooding related to stream bank overflow.

The completed plan should be ready for local review during the next 12 months.

## Federal Flood Insurance Program Management

The Commission has continued its program to qualify residents of units of local government for federally subsidized flood insurance. Ordinances have been written for Bloomington and Normal in order to control future construction in areas subject to flood damage. Applications to join the program were prepared by the staff for several small communities in McLean County.

## Transportation

In 1983, the Commission condensed the Transportation System Development Planning Process into a Long Range Element and a Short Range Element. Together these two elements encompass a 20 year planning horizon, with the Short Range Element focusing on years 1 through 5 and the Long Range Element on years 6 through 20.

The Long Range Element of the process uses a plan map and text to convey public polloy regarding compatibility between land uses in the urban area and the development of the roadway system. The staff uses these documents in the day-to-day plan review process to insure that the appropriate transportation facility accompanies each development.

Highlights of this process in 1983 included updating the urban area's Federal Aid Urban System: updating the FAU system insures effective use of available federal funds to maintain and expand the urban area's roadway system. The Commission has also been reviewing alternative uses for railroad rights-of-way proposed for abandonment. Alternatives that have been investigated include construction of a new major north-south street through the urban area and development of a series of loops to be used for bicycling, jogging, and walking.

Development of the Short Range Element accounts for the bulk of the tensportation planning work conducted by the staff. In 1983 this element brought together the Transit Development Program the Street and Highway portion of the System Management Plan and the Transportation Improvement Program into a single five year transportation planning document.

The Transit Development Program facused on evaluating the operational and financial performance of the Bloomington Normal Public Transit System. Analyses were also conducted to determine the impacts of weather, fares, and socio-economic characteristics on transit usage. All of the analyses conducted are directed toward improving the System's operational and financial performance by identifying the operational changes, financial and capital equipment needs of the System over the life of the plan.

The Street and Highway Element Uses the system management approach to solve general system or location-specific transportation problems. In short, this means that the most cost-effective solution is sought to solve each identified problem. During the post year the Commission used this approach to analyze traffic accident problems along corridors and at intersections, intersection traffic delay problems and to assess the physical condition of the urban area's roadway system. In each case where problems were identified, cost-effective and easily implemented solutions were recommended.

Within this element, the staff also conducted studies that addressed locally important transportation issues. Issues that were addressed included the types and amounts of hazardous materials that were transported through the urban area and the structural adequacy of the urban area's streets to handle current truck traffic.

The final component of the Short Range R an is the Transportation Improvement Program This program details the roadway and transit projects that are planned for implementation thou gh (sc q year 1988. Several of these projects are the result of Commission studies in the past.

It is hoped that the efforts put forth within the regional transportation planning process will allow the area to maintain a high quality transportation system as well as expand it in accordance with the area's overall development.

## A-95 Review

The objective of the A-95 Review and Comment Process is to provide state and local officials with a mechanism for influencing proposed federal assistance in light of their own comprehensive planning goals and objectives.

Applicants applying for federal funding are required to notify the McLean County Regional Planning Commission (the Substate Clearinghouse) of their in-

## Program Development Community Development

The Commission provides technical assistance to the City of Bloomington and the Town of Normal in operating their Community Development Block Grant Programs. During 1983, the City of Bloomington received \$705,000 and the Town of Normal received \$434,000 as Community Development Block Grant entitlement cities

Special services provided under the Community Development program included the preparation and maintenance of records for the "Jobs Bill" program—funds made available to Bloomington and Normal from the Department of Housing and Urban Development for stimulating job creation/retention.
Bloomington received \$247,000 and Normal received \$152,000 to utilize unemployed persons in projects benefiting the community

Other activities in Bloomington include the preparation of materials for the Market Square Tax Increment Financing Project, numerous demographic profiles for commercial/industrial economic development, and the preparation of various planning documents for the redevelopment of the "Old St. Joseph's Hospital Site."

In Normal, a new brochure explaining activities eligible for home rehabilitation grants was prepared and made ovailable for public distribution. This brochure has been very successful in making people aware of this aspect of the Community Development program within the Town.

## Mid Central Economic Opportunity Corporation (M.C.E.O.C.)

The Commission provides planning services to the Md Central Economic Opportunity Corporation. Dur

ing the year, the staff conducted a survey of Livingston and McLean Counties that identified the needs and desires of both clients and providers of social services. The staff also prepared and published on Energy Emergency Plan, which was directed toward lower income persons

## Special Projects 1980 Decennial Census

The staff continued to act as a liaison to the Bureau of the Census for the decennial census taken April 1. 1980. Local knowledge and documentation of various conditions are necessary as a part of the Bureau's efforts to certify the Information they

Due to restrictions in funding, the U.S. Bureau of the Census has released much of the census information in "non-printed" form, i.e., computer tapes. In cooperation with Illinois State University's Community Research Services, however, the computer topes have been transformed into paper printouts. Census information is now available for the entire county, townships, incorporated places, census tracts, and enumeration districts. Since the publication of data by the Bureau will be minimal, the staff has been actively participating in the dissemination of census information. This includes acting as a clearinghouse for census data and generally providing information to the public on what data can be found in the cen-

Information is also available for various neighborhoods in Bloomington and Normal because the two communities participated in the Bureau of the Census Neighborhood Statistics Program. This program offered detailed census information by locally defined neighborhoods and provided a type of data that has never been available before

The Commission has also provided data to the Bureau on "Major Retail Centers" within the County and the annual Boundary and Annexation Surveys.

## **Economic Development**

The staff researched and provided numerous site and/or location maps for the potential development of Industrial and commercial properties located in the metropolitan area

## Blooming ton Public Schools, District 87

The staff developed a report for the school district administration that forecast student enrollment by grade for the years 1990 and 2000.

# Technical Assistance

## Mdean County

Zoning — The staff has prepared reports for the McLean County Zoning Board of Appeals concerning the following cases during the last fiscal year

Other — The staff assisted the County Administrator in preparing for the interconnection of computer systems between the McLean County Courthouse and the Law and Justice Center. The staff prepared a map and specifications used by the County for the purpose of letting bids for the installation of optic fiber cable in abandoned traffic signal conduit owned by the City of Bloomington. The staff also developed the initial draft of an intergovernmental agreement between the City and the County for use of the conduit.

## City of Bloomington

Subdivisions and Planned Unit Developments Between December 1, 1982, and November 30, 1983, the staff has reviewed and provided planning advice to the Bloomington Planning Commission and City Coungl on 10 subdivisions and planned unit developments.

Capital Improvements Program — The staff has advised the Bloomington City Manager, Director of Finance and other department heads in completing a five-year capita improvements program for the 1984-1989 Five Year Budget.

Street and Alley Vacations — Between December 1 1982, and November 30, 1983, the staff has provided written recommendations to the Bloomington Planning Commission and City Council on one street vacation and three alley vacations

Historic Preservation Ordinance — The staff drafted a new Historic Preservation Ordinance that was subsequently adopted by the Bloomington City

Flood Hazard Area Development Code — The staff drafted a new Flood Hazard Area Development Code that was subsequently adapted by the Bloomington City Council.

### Town of Normal

Zoning — Since December 1, 1982, the staff has provided reports and recommendations, as a part of the Town staff, to the City Manager, Normal Town Council, Planning Commission, and Zoning Board of Appeals concerning

Subdivisions — The staff has provided reports and recommendations, as a part of the Town staff, to the City Manager, Town Council, and Normal Planning Commission on one preliminary subdivision plan and two preliminary plans for planned unit develop-

Comprehensive Plan—The staff has prepared a proposed revised Comprehensive Plan for the Town of Normal. The Town's present Comprehensive Plan was adopted by the Town Council In 1977. A Comprehensive Plan is an official public document adopted by a local government as a policy guide for decisions about the physical development of the community. It indicates, in a general way, how the governing officials want the community to develop in the next 10 to 20 years.

Special Flood Hazard Area Regulations—The staff drafted the Special Flood Hazard Area Regulations for the Town of Normal, which went into effect September 1. All development activities on property located in Special Flood Hazard Areas on the Town's Flood Hazard Boundary Map or Flood Insurance
Rate Map are subject to these regulations. Special Flood Hazard Areas are those areas subject to the base flood (also known as a 100 year flood).

Citizen Opinion Survey—The Commission staff malled 2,108 questionnaires to residents of the Town of Normal, the method used for the survey was a mailout/mail-back questionnaire. The survey was based upon a 20 percent sample of households in eight out of Normal's ten census tracts. Samples from two census tracts were not included in the survey because these two areas contain the Illino's State University campus and Normal's downtown. Survey results were tabulated by the staff for the approximately 1,000 questionnaires that were returned.

Multiple-Family Zoning Study—The staff prepared a report concerning the quantity of land zoned for multiple-family use within the Town of Normal and analyzed the sufficiency of the amount of such zoned land relative to expected future papulation growth. This report included three major sections population changes, housing trends, and projections and forecasts. It discussed past population growth within the Town, number of existing and future housing units and household size population projections and forecasts, and housing projections and forecosts
